Kindergarten Orientation

Kindergarten 2022 Orientation will begin on Thursday 28th October. Activities will be held on the three Thursdays following this —4th, 11th and 18th November. During Term 4 students will be completing a series of lessons about Child Protection. The lessons will include the following content:

K-Year 2

Showing respect, same but different, my support network, my body is private, safe and unsafe touch, confusing touch, happy and unhappy secrets, what is bullying?, what can I do about bullying?, my strategies.

<u>Years 3-4</u>

Respect and empathy, identity, power to help or harm?, types of abuse, gender based discrimination, responding to accidents and abuse, bribes and threats, how can I be an upstander, my strategies.

<u>Years 5-6</u>

Respect in the classroom and community, relationships and changes, my support network, effects of emotions, rights in relationships, safety online, coercion, sources of power, my strategies.






Visual Arts







Senior Inquiry

During Term 4 we will be learning how to use the *Ideation Process* to develop our skills in creativity and problem solving. We will generate creative ideas and apply a STEM lens to design our projects. This week we had fun with a 'slap-down' activity where our ideas were laid on the table, no matter how crazy they seemed.







Junior Maths

In Maths we are learning to use a variety of informal units to measure the mass of objects. We have been comparing the mass of everyday grocery items found in our homes and we have been ordering items from lightest to heaviest. Some of us are also learning about grams and kilograms and we are using formal scales to measure and compare the mass of items.










We are continuing to develop our number skills by playing a variety of games with our classmates.








Junior Maths Continued








Junior STEM

Stage 1 of the Lennox Village Vision project is now underway. Cultural heritage investigations in Ross Park, Lennox Park and Ballina Street are expected to be completed by mid-October.

The following works will commence from **Monday 11 October 2021**:

- Under boring and installation of new drinking water mains.
- Installation of new stormwater pipes and gross pollution traps in Ross Park and Lennox Park.

Minor landscaping works in Ross Park.

The above works are expected to take eight weeks to complete (weather and site conditions permitting).

During this time the following changes will be in place:

Removal of carparking in Rayner Lane adjacent to Ross Park.

Footpath changes and pedestrian detours.

- Parking will be reduced and may, at times, be unavailable in front of businesses. Council encourages local residents and visitors to use alternative parking and walk to Ballina Street.
- Council's project team will liaise with businesses to maintain customer and delivery access where possible, or provide alternative access points.
- Noise will be present during construction, this will include concrete saw cutting of existing surfaces. Construction will be Monday to Friday (7am - 6pm) and some Saturdays (8am - 1pm). Works may also be required out of hours.

Undergrounding of electricity works are **tentatively** scheduled to commence between 11 and 18 October, and will take approximately 8 to 10 weeks to complete. Impacted residents and businesses will be notified once a start date has been confirmed.

Council apologises for any inconvenience caused and thanks the community for their patience.



Temporary entry conditions for Ballina Shire Council facilities

Ballina Shire Council is working hard to keep our community and staff safe during the COVID-19 pandemic.

To fulfil our obligation under the NSW Public Health Order, entry conditions to several Council facilities will temporarily change from **Monday 11 October to Tuesday 30 November 2021.**

From **Monday 11 October all members of the public aged 16+** who attend the below Council's facilities will be required to:

1. Be fully vaccinated

2. Sign in with the mandatory QR code (includes children)

Wear a mask while indoors (persons aged over 12)

Be prepared to provide evidence of exemption to police or authorised officers if these requirements cannot be met.

These entry conditions will be required at the following Council facilities:

- Alstonville Aquatic Centre
- Ballina Indoor Sports Centre
- Ballina Visitor Information Centre
- Ballina War Memorial Swimming Pool
- Lennox Head Cultural Centre
- Northern Rivers Community Gallery

Ignite Studios

We ask patrons entering these venues to be patient and respectful as our staff adjust to these new requirements.

Council would also like to congratulate our local community for their efforts over the past 18 months. Overall, the community has consistently followed public health orders, continued to support local business, and has rolled up their sleeves to help protect themselves and others.

More than 57% of Ballina Shire residents over the age of 15 are fully vaccinated, and 87% have received one dose. These vaccination rates are key to arming our community against COVID-19 and enjoying more freedoms.
